The teacher before me, had led the students to do so many amazing things that I could not just let them sit on a shelf unviewed. This was the beginning of my journey to guide, support, and encourage my students this year to SPEAK LOUDLY, BOLDLY, AUDACIOUSLY, with conviction and BE who they are without concern for what the world or anyone else may think of them. I have decided to design each project

#### Youth Art For Healing "Gifts of Gratitude"

Charles Herbert Flowers High School had the opportunity to be a part of Youth Art For Healing's "Gifts of Gratitude" project that was introduced during the Pandemic. Flowers students created 24 paintings in the virtual environment and were able to have two students meet the healthcare workers that would receive their paintings. The video reveal was recently released and shows the impact students' art can have on the community.

Since the founding of Youth Art For Healing in 2012, they have partnered with over 50 schools in Montgomery County, Prince George's County, and Washington, D.C. Over 2100 talented student artists have created 1,664 healing works of art - 1,588 artworks for permanent installation in diverse healthcare environments and 76 Gifts of Gratitude paintings for frontline healthcare workers caring for patients during the Covid-19 pandemic.

After students complete this year's 203 paintings in March 2022, the total number of YAFH artworks created since 2012 will be 1,867. This includes 1,667 works of art for permanent installation in healthcare sites and 200 Gifts of Gratitude for frontline healthcare workers. We thank Youth Art for Healing for their partnership and support of our amazing artists!
