LEARNING FOCUS

Reading Language Arts

- In reading, students will learn about asking and answering questions about a text, identifying main topic, retelling key details, and making connections between story events.
- The October phonics focus skills are decoding and encoding words with short vowel sounds, blending phonemes, segmenting sounds
- New Heart words: he, was, his, on, are, as, with, this, they, if
- The writing focus is sentence construction.

Social Studies

- In social studies, students will be able to explain and identify the American symbols and documents as it relates to the role of government.
- Students will identify leadership positions and organizations in the community and explain how they can help in maintaining safety and order.

Math

- In math, we have started a unit on Attributes of 2D Shapes.
- Students will identify attributes of a shapes.
- Students will compose and decompose shapes to create new shapes.
- Students will partition shapes into 2 or 4 equal parts.

Science

- In science, students will be learning about how plants share similar parts, even if they look different.
- Students will be able to identify patterns in physical characteristics between adult and young plants.
