Why Do We Celebrate the Black History Month?

Woodson worked with an organization to create what he called Negro History Week choosing February to honor the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. Mr. Woodson did not like that most schools used textbooks at the time, ignored much of black history and the contributions of all kinds of black historical figures. So he decided to take matters into his own hands and help raise awareness. The week grew into a monthlong celebration in 1976, when President Gerald Ford urged Americans to recognize the central role of Black History in the nation's story.

More than a look back, Black History Month is a reminder to learn from the past, celebrate diversity and work toward a more equal future.
